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One of my favorite games is Prey 2006. It had revolutionary new mechanics such as portals and gravity paths that let you walk on walls.

I felt quite reminded of the that game as I started walking alongside walls and taunted big purple dudes as I was hanging from the ceiling.

The puzzles are quite challenging in the same way Portal is challenging the first time you play it. The game mechanics and physics are just so alien to you that it takes time for your brain to adapt.

This game honestly should be as popular as the original Portal was, but that's the plight of indie gaming on steam: no one notices you among heaps of triple A boring brown cover shooters.. Just fantastic! The worst thing I can say about this game is that it is not long enough! I loved everything about it, and if it was bigger and had more missions, I could easily play for oblivion like 100 plus hours. Great job creators! I even got a kick about reading the credits book [?] hopefully you will work on a sequel (triple the size of this one) thanks for 5 plus hours of incredible VR gaming. One day in the year 2000 I stumbled across a simple looking game called Uniball and decided to give it a try.

Years later, I finally started going to meetings to break the habit.

Now Uniball has been revamped and made available on Steam; and I'm enjoying every minute of my relapse!

You'll learn how to play within a minute, but it'll take thousands of hours to come even close to mastering this highly competitive e-sport!. Since the recommendation compares Ethan: Meteor Hunter to Braid, I bought it hoping for challenging and well-designed puzzles, but the challenge and the difficulty of this game comes solely from jumping on and over things at the right time. As far as puzzles go, you can freeze time and rearrange some parts of the area you are in, but it is not too hard to figure out what you need to do and when you need to do it. The platformer part, on the other hand, is frustratingly hard, and you can't make it easier by being smart with the puzzles. After the first couple of levels, I can't even get from checkpoint to checkpoint without dying a million times, which simply prevents me from enjoying this game at all.

On the whole, I don't recommend the game for it's original price, especially if you'd buy it for the puzzles. If you like difficult platformers, you might like it though.

Cons

Pros

- the HOS are clear and easy, although there was the occasional pixel miss and poor translation
- the travelling map was good and shows you where you still have stuff to do
- you'll get all of the achievements, even if you use a hint or skip a puzzle
- I think there was only one puzzle and I skipped it because it was terribly put together. I'm a puzzle-idiot, so I was happy.

The story was a bit lame, but I was happy not to be transported back in time or have to rely on some mythical creature to help me solve the mystery. I wouldn't pay full price for this, but I did enjoy it.. Great art style. And the music fits very well, too. I guess turning the volume of the sounds down a little wouldn't hurt though.. An adventure game which is predominantly a visual novel, Little Red Lie offers phenomenal writing and artwork and gets a very strong recommendation to narrative game fans for both its small cost and short, but adequate length.

The developer of this game first came to my attention a few years ago with Actual Sunlight, a similar game about the protagonists struggle with depression and thoughts of suicide. Despite the dark subject matter, the writing of the game was humorous, touching and witty, putting a very human face on the very serious problem of depression and suicide.

Little Red Lie is more about society than mental illness, but the take on society is every bit as dark and dismal as clinical depression. And, its not wrong. The issues brought up by the game are very real and the arguments are very convincing. The two protagonists are fully alive, with their own struggles, personality, and experiences shining through. I feel like I know Arthur and Sarah like real people and I am glad I got to meet them.

Although the writing, dialogue (much of it internal) and characters are excellent, the game struggles a bit with the story arc and game design. I like that the game is short, but I think it could have been much longer, and would then justify more art, music and writing and really move beyond Actual Sunlight in terms of scale, scope and value.

Nevertheless, I couldn't stop playing this one until I got to the end, and I recommend it to any narrative game fan or gamer who likes to read, or write serious literature.

Some other narrative VN/adventure games I have played and enjoyed would also include: All 3 Zero Escape games, The House in Fata Morgana, Steins; Gate, Yumei Nikki, Mad Father, Higurashi when they Cry and of course, Actual Sunlight.

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
