One of the earliest known Sanskrit documents is the Atharvaveda, one of the four Vedas. In October 2006 an Old Tamil Inscription from Anuradhapura in Sri Lanka was also reported as being in Old Tamil. These two examples have been described as being early Tamil-Brahmi inscriptions by Rajalakshmi Sureshkumar and Swami Priyadarsi at a conference hosted by Thumbay Rajeevarayanam at the University of Madras on 14 November 2006.
